SUBJECT: 2022 Legislative Session - Committee Week 3 Summary (October 18-22)

After a slow committee week last week, the Legislature immediately returned for the third committee week. While the workshops and topic presentations continued strong, the budget presentations are coming to an end, with only three committees meeting for that purpose. Additionally, we saw the first bills being heard so far during committee weeks, with four House bills and one Senate bill, all of them passing their first stops. As in the last two committee weeks, nothing too eventful happened this week with the exception of another prominent Democrat has entered the 2022 Governor's race, DeSantis called for a Special Session, and the next Senate President was nominated and confirmed for the 2022-2024 term. The legislators have the next week off, before returning to the Capitol for Committee Week 4 on November 1. These and other topics are covered below in our summary of the week that was in Tallahassee.

Notable Topics

Senator Taddeo enters Governor race

On Monday, Senator Annette Taddeo (SD 40 – part of Miami-Dade County) formally announced her candidacy for the 2022 Florida Governor race. Sen. Taddeo, aiming to be Florida's first Latina Governor, is a state senator serving since 2017. Taddeo previously ran as Charlie Crist's running mate for Lieutenant Governor in 2014, and more recently she ran for Congress in 2016 where she

lost in the primary. She was the Vice Chair of the Florida Democratic Party from 2013-2016. With the primary only 10 months away, the Gubernatorial hopeful is starting from behind, as Democratic candidate Charlie Crist joined the race almost six-months ago, and Nikki Fried has the Agricultural Commissioner since 2018, when she was the first Democrat to win a statewide election since 2006.

First Lady makes first appearance

On October 4, Governor DeSantis released a statement announcing that First Lady Casey DeSantis was diagnosed with breast cancer. There have been no updates to date as of her status, however she made a surprise first public appearance since the announcement this past Saturday night at the Hernando County Lincoln/Reagan Day Dinner. She has since resigned from her position as Chair of the Florida Children and Youth Cabinet, which the Governor recently named the State Surgeon General, Dr. Joseph A. Ladapo, as chair.

Senate President Designation Ceremony

At the meeting of the Senate Republican Caucus on Tuesday, chaired by Senate Majority Leader Debbie Mayfield and President Simpson, Senator Kathleen Passidomo was nominated and confirmed to serve as President of the Florida Senate for the 2022-2024 legislative term. Passidomo would be the third woman to be Senate President, and the first in 22 years. During her designation speech, she said that unlike California "the land of dying dreams," "Florida is: full of jobs and opportunity; the "go to" state for business relocation; a preeminent tourist destination; home to 20 major military installations and the most veteran friendly state in the nation; where students can get an excellent education and the opportunity for school choice; where homes and business can depend on affordable and reliable power; and where families can access high quality health care. Here in Florida, the Florida Dream is alive and well. But we cannot take that for granted. We have to fight for the Florida Dream." She focused on economic growth and strengthening Florida's education system. Governor DeSantis, Lieutenant Governor Nuñez, Chief Financial Officer Patronis, and Attorney General Moody, House Speaker Sprowls and Speaker-Designate Rennner, former Senate Presidents Tom Lee, Jeff Atwater, and Mike Haridopolos were all in attendance.

Florida's Ports are open and ready

On Tuesday during a press conference at the Jacksonville Port, Governor DeSantis announced that Florida Seaports have open capacity and can meet holiday demand, while other seaports across the country are struggling to keep up. At the event, JAXPORT announced that they will be offering incentives to any company that chooses to bring its business to the port, freeing up backlogs at other ports while ensuring Americans are able to receive the goods they order faster. Florida has continually invested in its ports, and since 2019 alone, Florida has invested nearly \$1 billion into its seaports to ensure there is capacity to serve as much cargo as possible. The state has also invested in infrastructure to make sure roadways are capable of handling the demand of today's freight movements.

Governor suspends debt collections for unemployment overpayments

Last Friday, Governor DeSantis ordered the Department of Economic Opportunity to suspend sending Floridians to debt collections if they've been issued an "overpayment" notice for their unemployment claims. Thousands of Floridians have been mailed notices from DEO stating that they must payback overpayments or be sent to debt collectors. Often, the notices do not state why the recipient owes money, nor how the amount owed was calculated, and in some cases the notices have been sent out after the deadline to appeal them has passed. The state had already said it was suspending sending overpayment notices to debt collectors until 2023, although DeSantis' announcement suspended them "indefinitely."

Social media literacy

Senator Burgess filed SB 480, which if passed, would require public schools to include "social media literacy" in their curriculum. It would direct the Florida Department of Education and county school boards to develop curriculum to teach social media literacy. The bill offers a detailed definition of social media but does not specify what literacy entails. Sen. Burgess said this is an "attempt to protect the children and to empower parents" by gaining a better awareness of the hazards children might encounter on popular internet platforms and mobile applications.

Budget projections are looking good

During the House Appropriations committees first meeting of committee weeks, Chair Trumbull noted that the budget is on the right path, after a bullish year Florida's fiscal signs are even better. Trumbull credited the state's job navigating the financial brunt of the pandemic on prudent budgeting and keeping Florida's economy open. Trumbull emphasized the importance of staying fiscally responsible. He noted the need to fund environmental projects but steered away from approving new recurring programs.

Governor calls for a Special Session

During a press conference in Clearwater Thursday morning, Governor DeSantis announced he was calling on the Legislature to convene for a Special Session. The focus of the session is to block the Biden Administration's vaccine mandates on large companies. "We want to make sure that individuals in the state of Florida have their rights protected," DeSantis said. The details are still being worked out but Senate President Simpson and House Speaker Sprowls released a joint statement suggesting one route may be to exempt Florida from the jurisdiction of the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), whom is responsible for enforcing Biden's mandate; if this is the chosen path, Florida would likely create their own program to take the place of the role OSHA plays. Governor DeSantis is asking the Legislature to provide protections for employees facing termination because of unfair, discriminatory COVID-19 vaccine mandates and to reaffirm that government entities including school districts may not fire any employee based on COVID-19 vaccine status. The Governor wants violating government entities to be held accountable, as well as to reevaluate employers' broad liability protections (passed last

session) if they harm employees through vaccine mandates. DeSantis is also calling on the Legislature to provide greater protections to parents to manage the health care decisions of their children, including the freedom to opt their children out of mask mandates. Democrats immediately started to knock the Special Session as DeSantis' "latest campaign play." The Special Session will be in November, and will not be during one of the already scheduled Committee Weeks.

Bolstering criminal drug laws passes first stop

On Thursday, the House Criminal Justice and Public Safety subcommittee passed HB 95, sponsored by Rep. Plakon, with a 14-4 party line vote. The bill, if passed, would make charging a drug dealer easier if they sell a controlled substance that led to someone's death. Currently, a drug dealer may face a death sentence or life in prison if they sell a controlled substance that verifiably caused the death of a consumer, however, the bill would broaden the law's scope allowing prosecutors to charge drug dealers with first-degree murder if a controlled substance is found to be a "substantial factor" in a person's death.

Vacation rentals bill is back

Sen. Burgess and Rep. Fischer have filed bills (SB 512 and HB 325) for statewide vacation rental and marketing platform regulations; similar versions of the bill have been seen in past sessions, last session the bill made it further than the bill has in previous sessions, but nonetheless died in the closing days of session. Florida's traditional lodging industry wants to see regulation similar to what they have to follow, while cities and counties want vacation rentals regulated locally. The marketing platforms are for the bill, as it would create uniform regulations, whereas now they have to follow different complex laws in every city and county. The proposed bills do little to tighten regulations on vacation rentals beyond what cities or counties already require of every other home. The measures continue to preempt almost all laws and regulations to the state, unless they were in place by 2011. The bills do, however, give local governments the power to require that vacation rentals be registered with local authorities with processing fees of up to \$50. The state would require marketing platforms to make sure sales and tourist taxes are collected and paid to the government, and that basic laws such as anti-discrimination are followed. The Division of Hotels and Restaurants would get the power to suspend lodging licenses, including for multiple violations of city ordinances on things like noise, parking, and trash.

Single-use plastics

Sen. Stewart and Rep. Grieco (SB 320 and HB 6063) are returning to a years-long effort to allow local governments to ban single-use plastics. Florida law currently states that "no local government, local governmental agency, or state government agency may enact any rule, regulation, or ordinance regarding use, disposition, sale, prohibition, restriction, or tax of such auxiliary containers, wrappings, or disposable plastic bags." That provision blocks cities and counties from barring those plastics, even if such a move would be supported by local residents. The bills would remove this language to give home rule back to cities and counties, enabling them

to decide on the issue locally. Similar versions of these bills have been seen in years past, although none have made significant movement in the process. In an interesting, across party lines twist, the Governor vetoed Republican legislation in 2019 that attempted to stop all local bans on singleuse plastic straws.

COVID Update

Florida reported 2,262 new COVID-19 cases and 465 more deaths on Thursday as the seven-day average dropped to its lowest point since July 5. The seven-day average for deaths was 186, and 2,207 for new cases. 59% of the state have been completely vaccinated. As of Thursday, there have been 3,633,097 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the state and 58,608 Floridians have died since the start of the pandemic, with 2,730 people hospitalized with COVID-19 in Florida, a more than 25% decrease from the previous week.

Redistricting

The Senate committee met this week to discuss the map drawing process and directives to staff, while the two House subcommittees met to review and discuss the current maps. On Monday, guidelines were approved by the Senate panel that will be used by legislative staff as they begin the process to draw the new congressional and legislative maps. For the congressional maps, which will include the addition of a new 28th district, will be drawn to not deviate plus or minus one person of the ideal population of 769,221. For legislative maps, the guidelines included directives to design new Senate districts so that no district deviates more than 1 percent from the average population total of 538,455, which mirrors the maps that were signed off by the Florida Supreme Court during the last redistricting process. During the House State Legislative Redistricting Subcommittee on Wednesday, Chair Byrd said that no maps have been drafted yet.
