SUBJECT: 2022 Legislative Session - Committee Week 4 Summary (November 1-5)

After a week off (filled with special session rumors and intrigue), the Legislature returned to Tallahassee for Committee Week 4. While we still saw workshops and topic presentations, there were no budget presentations this week. The Senate hit the ground running, hearing 33 bills (all of which were passed) in 7 committees and one confirmation hearing; the House did not hear any bills this week. The legislators have next week off, before convening back in Tallahassee on November 15 for a Special Session, which should make for an eventful week. These and other topics are covered below in our summary of the week that was in Tallahassee.

NAIOP Activities

The GR team held its monthly zoom meeting with NAIOP representatives, as well as continued to work with legislative leaders on fire code and EV charging station issues related to commercial development. As the white papers are finalized, our team will refine its efforts.

Notable Topics

COVID liability protection extension

SB 72 (2021), sponsored by Sen. Brandes, was the first piece of legislation to be signed by the Governor last session. The bill provided Florida businesses with protections from COVID-related lawsuits, which contained provisions applying to general liability claims filed against businesses, as well as extending protections to health care providers from COVID-19-related claims alleging medical malpractice or violations of nursing home residents' rights. SB 72 was signed into law on March 29, 2021 and was set to expire one year later on March 29, 2022. Sen. Brandes recently

filed SB 610, which would extend the legislation to all claims before December 31, 2023. This bill does not change the underlying law or exclude businesses with vaccine mandates from the protections, as Governor DeSantis has recently called for. There is currently no House companion.

Florida welcomes Police

During an interview on Sunday, Governor DeSantis announced plans to offer law enforcement officers \$5,000 bonuses to relocate and join a Florida police force. This move comes after first responders continue to clash with city leaders, all over the nation, over vaccine mandates; many officers have been forced to resign or be fired over non-compliance with mandates in other states. "If you're not being treated well, we'll treat you better here," DeSantis said, "you can fill important needs for us, and we'll compensate you as a result." Any law enforcement officer who has not previously worked in Florida would be eligible, and they will not be asked to verify their vaccination status as a condition of employment. This would come in the form of legislation this session, although no bills have been filed yet.

Plane sales tax departure

Rep. Overdorf has sponsored HB 6051, which would exempt all aircraft sales and leases from sales and use tax. This is a continued years long effort that Republicans have pushed, that has not been able to make it to the finish line in past sessions. Currently, plane sales for use by common carriers (Delta, Southwest, etc.) are exempt from Florida's 6% sales tax. The bill, which does not yet have a Senate companion, would apply that exemption to sales of charter or private planes of any side. The bill will be a job booster, said Rep. Overdorf, currently many purchasers buy aircraft out-ofstate, then wait six to eight months to relocate the plane to Florida.

Gambling prevention expansion

HB 405 (Reps. Plakon and Davis) would expand the promotion of Florida's (888)-ADMIT-IT Helpline to all 67 counties; currently, the helpline advertising is limited to Broward and Miami-Dade counties. The bill would take .3% of annual gross revenue from Florida online and instant lottery tickets to fund the program. This measure comes after state leaders struck a new gaming compact with the Seminole Tribe of Florida in April. The deal, among other provisions, expanded online sports betting in Florida. Demand has grown since the program first started in 2005. "It has been over 20 years since we first acknowledged our obligation to mitigate the effects and adverse impacts upon our state resulting from the various regulated forms of gambling we allow in our state," Plakon said. "We are long overdue in making sure our state prevention program meets the needs of our state in 2021 and beyond." Sen. Baxley is sponsoring the Senate companion.

DeSantis sues Biden

Last week the state of Florida filed suit against the federal government over the Biden Administration's mandate that federal contractors require their employees to be vaccinated against COVID-19. "They're transforming normal contracting into basically public health policy," DeSantis said at an event in Lakeland. DeSantis said that the mandate, stemming from President

Biden's executive order earlier this year, exceeds federal authority. Biden's actions were based on federal law, the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act, giving him the power over federal government property. The lawsuit argues Biden overstepped his authority under that law.

Special Session

Last week at a press conference, Governor DeSantis stated his intent to call the Legislature into a Special Session. DeSantis sent an official memo to President Simpson and Speaker Sprowls, calling the Legislature into session from November 15-19, a week when legislators were already scheduled to be in Tallahassee for Committee Week 5.

The Governor has asked the Legislature to consider legislation that will:

- Protect employees against discrimination on the basis of vaccination status, including educational institutions and government entities against employees, students, and residents;
- Ensure that employees improperly denied employment due to vaccination status can be eligible for reemployment benefits;
- Appropriate funds to investigate complaints and take legal action regarding vaccination mandates;
- Clarify that the Parents' Bill of Rights vests the decision on masking with parents and that schools must comply;
- Limit mandates by school districts regarding COVID-19 and related mitigation measures;
- Provide adequate enforcement mechanisms to ensure that Florida law is followed and the rights of parents are honored;
- Direct the State to evaluate whether it should assert jurisdiction over occupational safety and health issues for government and private employees;
- Repeal the authority for the State Health Officer to order forced injections or vaccinations under Section 381.00315, Florida Statutes, originally enacted in 2002; and
- Create as necessary public records exemptions related to complaints and investigations described herein.

Sports betting is live

Months after the Compact was signed by Governor DeSantis, approved by the Legislature, and accepted by the Department of Interior, the Hard Rock Sportsbook App is live and Floridians can now place bets. There was little fanfare or advertisement leading up to the app launch on Monday, hinting that this was more of a soft-launch, but nonetheless sports betting is now live to the general public. The platform is only available via mobile application, there is no computer web based platform.

VISIT FLORIDA

Sen. Hooper's bill (SB 434) to postpone the sunset date of VISIT FLORIDA passed its first committee this week. VISIT FLORIDA is the state's tourism marketing agency, which was

originally created by the Legislature in 1996, is currently set to dissolve at the end of 2023. SB 434 would extend that dissolution date to 2031. A similar House bill (HB 489) was filed that would extend the program until 2028. The Senate bill has one more committee stop, Appropriations. In past years, the Senate has tried to get rid of VISIT FLORIDA's sunset clause in state law, which would allow it to run in perpetuity, but the House has not agreed to the measure. Under former House Speakers Corcoran and Oliva, the House tried to eliminate the program under the idea taxpayer dollars should not be used for marketing campaigns. The Legislature has recently kept VISIT FLORIDA on a rolling, two-year lifespan, moving the sunset clause forward every year. In recent years, the House has been less of an ally to VISIT FLORIDA than the Senate, but has dropped its previous ambitions to abolish the program. Last year, the House agreed to \$50 million in the state's regular budget, then boosted the program's budget by \$25 million using federal funding passed as part of President Joe Biden's coronavirus relief package. However, these funds were nonrecurring general revenue dollars, which means each year the agency must be affirmatively funded by the Legislature. "VISIT FLORIDA is as important to the economy and economic wealth of our state as any other endeavor that I can possibly think of," said Sen. Hooper. "The hard part for that agency, with only a two-year sunset, attracting and retaining qualified, the best-of-the-best people at the agency is really difficult," Hooper said.

Free books from the Speaker

Last session, the Legislature passed Speaker Sprowls' New Worlds Reading Initiative, and Governor DeSantis signed it into law this summer. The program provides free book home delivery to elementary students who read below grade level, and recipients will get one free book every month for nine months of the year, throughout the school year. The Lastinger Center at the University of Florida, which the state selected in July to get the program running, announced that the free books are getting shipped on time next month to 30,000 students. Over 500,000 students are eligible for the program, however, students must opt-in. Parents currently enroll their students online, but the Lastinger Center is developing a paper application that will be available next year to make it easier for homeless students and students without internet access to enter the program. The Legislature set aside \$200 million in state and federal funds to get the New Worlds Reading Initiative started over the next four years.

Retroactive sentencing passes first committee

In the last decade, the Legislature has lowered sentences and removed some minimum mandatory sentences. Sen. Rouson's SB 276, which would allow those serving the previous mandatory time for some charges to be resentenced under the new standards, passed the Senate Criminal Justice Committee unanimously this week. "In sum, this bill is about hindsight. It's about equity and fairness in sentencing," Rouson told the panel. Sen. Rouson sponsored similar legislation last session that ultimately died in its last committee stop.

Firefighter protection

A bill that would stiffen criminal penalties for those who murder an on-duty firefighter unanimously passed its first committee stop this week. Sen. Hooper's SB 370 would charge a convicted murderer of a firefighter with the same punishment as a person who killed a police officer, life in prison without the possibility of parole. "Those that serve and protect us need to have the same protection when they are attacked and killed," Hooper said. The bill has a House companion, HB 351 by Rep. Duggan.

COVID Update

Florida reported 1,804 new COVID-19 cases and zero deaths on Tuesday. The seven-day average for deaths was 81, and 1,607 for new cases. This builds on the latest data that 59% of the state have been completely vaccinated. As of Thursday, there have been 3,654,441 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the state and 59,499 Floridians have died since the start of the pandemic, with 1,865 people hospitalized with COVID-19 in Florida. The State of Florida has one of the lowest COVID-19 daily average case rates in the last 7 days per 100,000 residents in the United States. "As Florida now ranks lowest in the continental US in terms of COVID-19 rates per capita, we are proud to have stood firm in protecting liberty throughout the pandemic," said Lieutenant Governor Nuñez. "Governor DeSantis' approach was guided by science, data, and pragmatism, not fear and alarmist narratives." Since August, COVID cases in school-aged children have decreased 87% since schools started, and cases in young adults ages 18 to 24 decreased 93%. Over 73% of eligible Floridians have been vaccinated, which is on par with national averages.

Redistricting

The House Redistricting Committee and two subcommittees all met this week for legal presentation on redistricting laws, while none of the Senate Redistricting Committees met. While the Senate Committee of Reapportionment has met three times thus far during Committee Weeks, the two Select Subcommittees have yet to meet. So far no map drafts have been discussed or released yet.
