**SUBJECT:** 2022 Legislative Session – Week 4 (January 31 – February 4)

As week four drew to a close, we saw a pickup of pace in the Capitol. Lawmakers continue to consider key session issues targeting changes in mail-in voting, net metering, and property insurance. The House and Senate budget proposals were heard throughout the week, and were ultimately published Friday afternoon. Finally, the advancements of the Senate and House redistricting maps created a single joint resolution which awaits approval of the Florida Supreme Court. These and other topics are covered in our summary of the week in Tallahassee.

# **NAIOP Activities**

It was a quiet week on policy issues, as the House and Senate rolled out their budgets respectively. The GR team continued to work with House and Senate stakeholders on issues related to two-way radios, fire inspections, building inspection legislation, EV charging station regulations, and building permit reform. These and other issues will be timely to address during NAIOP Days.

## **Notable Topics**

#### Appointment Power

Senator Bean's proposal (SB 1658) to reclassify the process for three executive appointments passed through its final committee on Thursday. The legislation would increase the power of Gov. DeSantis for appointments of the secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), the commissioner of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) and the executive director of the Department of Veteran's Affairs (VA). This issue arises after Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried collided with DeSantis about his move to appoint the DEP Secretary without approval from the state cabinet. Currently, the DEP, FDLE and VA appointments require unanimous approval from the Cabinet. The proposal would allow for a majority vote of the Governor and Cabinet on the FDLE and VA appointments subject to Senate confirmation, and for the DEP appointment the Governor can either seek unanimous approval by the Cabinet or Senate confirmation.

#### Congressional Map

After the Senate moved forward without Governor DeSantis' map, the Governor asked the Florida Supreme Court to weigh in on the issues of the congressional map. His proposal would eliminate Democratic Rep. Lawson's district while the Senate version keeps it intact. In his five-page request, DeSantis questions if Florida's voter-approved redistricting standards requires this seat (west of Tallahassee to downtown Jacksonville) to remain as it is currently drawn. He alludes to the Florida Constitution's non-diminishment standard when asking justices if it mandates a "sprawling congressional district...solely to connect black voters in Jacksonville with black voters in Gadsden and Leon Counties so that they may elect candidates of their choice." This seat currently has a 44% Black voting population. Rep. Lawson responded to DeSantis' proposal saying it would affect minorities and sees it as an attempt to dilute the voting rights of his constituents.

#### Election Law Changes

Senators advanced a measure (SB 524) that would make changes to mail-in voting including creating a new election police backed by Gov. DeSantis. Restrictions on mail-in ballots, drop boxes and "ballot harvesting" were put forward. Democrats oppose this bill asserting it allows for DeSantis to cater to the "ultra-right" who seek enforcement on voting. Election supervisors warn of the new provisions and the extra steps they will need to take if this bill passes.

#### Solar Bill

Current law allows for solar panel owners to sell any excess energy generated by the panels to utilities at the retail rate that utilities charge other customers. Under a new proposal (HB 741),

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solar panel owners would be required to charge a cheaper wholesale price. In its first committee stop (Tourism, Infrastructure & Energy Subcommittee), solar industries across Florida spoke against this bill, arguing that it would kill the emerging rooftop solar industry. In response to these concerns, Rep. McClure, the bill sponsor, says "just be patient and know we are absolutely having great dialogue to find the middle ground." After a 13-3 vote, the bill has two more committee stops. The Senate version (SB 1024) is set to be heard in its second committee (Community Affairs) on Tuesday.

### **Property Insurance**

The rising property insurance market continues to be an issue in the Florida Legislature. Senate Bill 1728 attempts to reform rising rates tied to roof insurance and minimize the size of the state-run Citizens Property Insurance. Previously, legislators have struggled to collaborate with issues on insurance reform. Senator Brandes told other members that they have to find an agreement with the House in order to pass this bill. During its first committee hearing (Banking and Insurance), matters of roof claims and the increasing costs related took the main focus. The bill sponsor, Sen. Boyd, included a requirement that a contractor must make it clear that the consumer must pay the deductible on the insurance policy and is illegal for a contractor to waive the deductible. Democrats raised concerns over the part of the legislation that allows insurers to write policies that offer a lower level of coverage for roofs. They claim it will disproportionately impact low-income homeowners who often have older homes and are in need of a new roof. The committee ultimately passed the bill by a vote of 9-2.

#### Legislative Maps

Unlike the Congressional maps that have been stalled for potential review by the Florida Supreme Court, the State House and Senate maps are near complete. After the Senate passed its map two weeks prior, the House moved its proposal forward earlier in the week in time for the Senate to review on Thursday. Amending its version onto Joint Resolution 100 on a 77-39 vote, the House legislative map has the potential to increase the Democratic seats to 49 while decreasing the Republican majority to 71.

The Senate map will likely give the Republicans a 23-17 lead over Democrats. The joint resolution (SB 100) now incorporates both the House map (H 8013) and Senate map (S 8058) and awaits final review by the Florida Supreme Court. The Court will have 30 days to conduct a high-level review to determine if the maps are in compliance with the state and federal voting laws.

#### Budget Plans

After the House and Senate's appropriation subcommittees unveiled their respective budgets earlier in the week, the full versions (SB 2500 and APC 1) were filed on Friday afternoon. While there are many highlights, health care continues to be all important. In the proposed budget plans, health care receives \$47.8 billion in the Senate while the House decided on \$47.1 billion. One of

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Health and Human Services Appropriations Committee Chair Senator Bean's focus is on directing \$685.5 million to ensure nursing home staff and care providers get an increase in pay.

On the House side, Health and Human Services Appropriations Chair Representative Avila is removing \$100 million in recurring revenue from hospitals and using it to train nurses. His budget includes spending \$163 million to raise the pay for Medicaid providers to \$13 an hour. While not a highlight (more of an omission), it is worth noting that a gas tax reduction sought by Gov. DeSantis did not find its way in the House's transportation and economic developmental budget proposal nor the Senate plan. The House also reduced DeSantis' request of \$100 million to \$25 million for the Job Growth Grant Fund while the Senate did not include it in their plan.

#### School Mask Mandates

\$200 million is on the line for school districts across Florida who previously adopted masking mandates on their campuses. In a proposal by House Education leaders, funding would be removed from schools that defied DeSantis' administration and redistributed to districts who never enacted masking policies. This past fall, the Florida Department of Health prohibited school districts from mandating masks, yet 13 school boards put a mask requirement in place during times when Covid-19 cases were significantly increasing. Budget chief, Rep. Fine, recommending this proposal states "They spent the money that we gave them to sue us...Clearly you have more money than you need". This cut would come from the salaries of school staffers who make more than \$100,000 annually but don't teach in classrooms. Also listed in the budget is an additional \$250 million for teacher salaries. The Senate's proposed budget does not include this funding reduction. Both proposals have one more stop before they are heard before the full appropriation committees.
